Trash and Sewer Fees to Increase

Due to increased costs, the West Goshen Township Board of Supervisors has increased sewage and trash rates from \$100 to \$150 per quarter effective with the third quarter 2009 billing cycle. This represents quarterly fees of \$85 for trash and \$65 for sewage. The last time sewage and trash rates were increased was in 2001.

The Township faces significant increases in trash disposal costs due to conditions outside of the Township's control. Through a contract with Allied Waste/Republic, all Township trash is collected and disposed of at the Lanchester Landfill in Narvon, Pennsylvania, operated by the Chester County Solid Waste Authority. The Township disposes of 10,000 tons of trash per year. In 1997, the Township was charged \$43 per ton by the Solid Waste Authority. In 2009, the Authority charges \$55 per ton. This is a significant cost increase over time.

In addition, beginning in 2010 West Goshen has been ordered by the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to divert more yard waste from trash collection, specifically to provide monthly yard waste collection. The Township historically has provided six yard and leaf waste collections annually, plus Christmas tree collections. Because of this new mandate, the Township had to renegotiate the recently awarded contract with Allied Waste to include the new yard and leaf waste collections at an increased cost.

The Township also faces significant increases in sewage treatment expenses and operating costs. The Township's Sewer Authority operates one of the most efficient and cost effective sewage treatment plants in the region. However, due to increased treatment expenses, the sewage treatment plant has operated at a deficit for the last four years. Including the enacted fee increase, West Goshen Township still provides one of the lowest residential sewage treatment fees in Chester County. Below is a chart showing some of West Goshen's neighboring municipalities' quarterly residential sewage treatment fees. ★

Subdivision and Land Development Report

The following plans have been approved for development:

QVC Studio Park – The land development plan constitutes 62,930 square feet of new offices and warehouse building additions located at 1200 Wilson Drive.

The following plans are new submissions for consideration:

West Goshen Sewer Authority – Land development plan for a 4,242 square foot garage located at 848 South Concord Road.

West Chester University – Land development plan for construction of a 9,135 square foot addition to E.O. Bull Center located at 2 East Rosedale Avenue.

Roslyn Swim Club – Land development proposing to convert the existing 1,200 square foot roofed deck into a locker room/bath house facility, construct a new 1,200 square foot roofed deck, install sidewalk access to the new facilities, including a handicap accessible sidewalk to further enhance and make more useable the existing facility.

The following plans remain under review:

Liberty Tool – Land development plan for a 26,000 square foot industrial supply warehouse facility with associated parking and stormwater management facilities, located at 1005 Saunders Lane.

The Woodlands at Greystone – The submitted plan proposes for the development of 598 dwelling units pursuant to the Flexible Design Conservation District regulations for a 446+ acre property located along

Greystone South – The proposed plan concerns a 25 lot residential subdivision located on the west side of Penn Drive, just north of the Route 322 bypass.

Greenhill Corporate Park: Unit 11 – Land development plan for a 34,480 square foot office building located at 1171 McDermott Drive.

R E Michael – Land development for property located at 322 Westtown Road which proposes to demolish the existing 6,493 square foot building and associated parking and driveway, and construct a new 14,542 square foot building with associated parking and driveway.

Hickman Land Development – Land development for property located at 352 Snyder Avenue which proposes to add a roof to a 2,048 square foot partially completed garage, and construct an additional 3,200 square foot garage. Both garages are to be used for the storage of vehicles for septic cleaning business.

Dash Enterprises – A land development which proposes to combine two lots into one for use as an auto storage lot with a 2,400 square foot reconstructed building to be used for auto preparation prior to sale. The property is located at 716 East Union Street.

Kirkland Woods – The plan proposes the subdivision of property located at 300 Kirkland Avenue into seven single family lots.

Keep Your Grass Under Twelve Inches

In combination with the additional rainfall we have experienced and the onset of the growing season, we have noticed a slight increase in the number of vacant homes in the township with untended lawns. For many years West Goshen Township has had a weeds/high grass ordinance in effect, which states that between May 1st and September 30th of each calendar year, the owner of each lot shall control excessive vegetation by mowing or cutting such lot as often as is necessary to keep grass, brush, weeds and similar vegetation, growing on a lot to a height not to exceed twelve inches.

If a property is found to be in violation of this ordinance, a letter will be sent to the property owner requiring the property be mowed within ten days of receipt of the letter. If at that time there has been no response by the property owner or the property remains in violation, the Township may exercise its option to contract with a local landscaper to maintain the property. The property owner will be responsible for the bill.

Please be mindful of your neighbors, and maintain your property throughout the growing season! ★



Safety Tips by Fire Marshal Andrea Testa

Be Smart, Be Safe with Grills

Chapter 41 of The West Goshen Township Code establishes the International Fire Code as the enacted Fire Prevention Code for the Township. According to Section 308.3.1 of the International Fire Code, charcoal burners and other open flame cooking devices shall not be operated on combustible balconies or within 10 feet of combustible construction. Section 308.3.1.1 of the International Fire Code mandates that liquefied petroleum gas burners having an LP gas container with a water capacity greater than 2.5 pounds shall not be located on combustible balconies or within 10 feet of combustible construction.

YOU Can Help Reduce Phosphorus Levels in West Goshen Township

Discharges from wastewater treatment plants are being faced with increasingly more stringent phosphorus limitations from the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection and the United States Environmental Protection Agency. At the West Goshen Wastewater Treatment Plant alone it is estimated that it will cost 24 million dollars to construct the facilities necessary to meet the new requirements. Many other treatment plants face much higher costs. A substantial increase in operation and maintenance costs due to chemical usage and sludge generation will also likely occur as a result of these new regulations. As a West Goshen resident and user of the sewer system, YOU can help offset some of these costs.


Many seemingly harmless activities added together can significantly increase the phosphorus loads on wastewater treatment plants and on streams. Phosphorus is found in lawn fertilizers, pesticides, cleaning compounds, detergents, and in human and other animal wastes. In West Goshen Township, one study has indicated that domestic waste (that's you) contributes almost 70% of the phosphorus introduced into the wastewater system.

- While phosphates are banned in commercial laundry soaps and hand dishwashing detergents, it is still readily used in automatic dishwasher

detergents. Voluntarily choosing a phosphate-free detergent would significantly lower the phosphorus load on the wastewater treatment plant and on the local streams. Phosphate-free detergents are now available at virtually all supermarkets. Remember, biodegradable does NOT mean phosphate-free!

- Avoid putting organic waste into your garbage disposal. Compost kitchen waste whenever possible.
- When fertilizing your lawn, choose an organic, phosphorus-free or low phosphorus fertilizer and only apply once a year in the fall when it will promote root development. Many commercial lawn care companies now offer these products and services. A soil test can be purchased for \$10 from the Chester County Extension Service to confirm if any phosphorus amendments are needed. Don't forget to leave grass clippings on the lawn to recycle nitrogen and phosphorus into the soil.

- You can also plant a rain garden. Rain gardens are planted areas designed to soak up rain water which drains from



a roof or other impervious surface. This allows for significantly more water to soak into the ground than conventional patches of lawn whereby decreasing downstream flooding, reducing stormwater runoff and erosion, and enhancing the filtering of pollutants. As part of a Goose Creek restoration project, West Goshen Township is partnering with the Chester-Ridley-Crum (CRC) Watershed Association and will be planting rain gardens at selected locations within the township. Homeowners will be able to visit the gardens where there will be information such as where to plant a garden, what to plant in a garden, and how a garden should be maintained. Stay tuned for further details.

Simple steps like these can drastically improve the water quality of our local water resources while at the same time provide a significant financial benefit of cutting treatment costs at the wastewater plant. ★

Are you considered a safe driver? Find out at DriveSafePA.org

As the summer driving season is about to shift into high gear, this is an ideal time to focus on highway safety. Whether it's buckling yourself and your children in the family vehicle or taking your motorcycle for a scenic ride, being a responsible driver is the key to everyone's safety on the road.

The Pennsylvania Department of Transportation has launched a new website, DriveSafePA.org, that enables motorists easy access to highway safety resources.

The site is part of PennDOT's new highway safety campaign, Drive Safe PA, which aims to save at least 100 or more lives on Pennsylvania highways each year. DriveSafePA.org offers information and tips on these highway safety areas: aggressive driving, bicycle/pedestrian traffic, child

passenger safety, heavy trucks, engineering infrastructure, impaired driving, mature drivers, motorcycle safety, school bus safety, seat belts, work zones, and young drivers. Each of these areas is highlighted as part of an interactive quiz that allows motorists to test their highway safety knowledge. In addition, the website contains educational resources, including videos, radio public service announcements and traffic safety brochures. Recently enacted traffic safety laws such as the "Steer Clear" law and wiper and headlights law are also included on the site. DriveSafePA.org will also include a monthly update on Pennsylvania traffic fatalities in an effort to emphasize the number of tragic losses that could be prevented by simply remembering to Drive Safe PA.

Lease Provides West Goshen Township with More Athletic Fields

In a move to provide a significant increase in active recreation opportunities for township residents, West Goshen recently entered into a 25-year lease agreement with the West Chester Area School District for use of the Henderson North athletic fields. The fields are located adjacent to the Township's Robert Lambert Park, home of the skatepark, tennis courts, playground, and Rooney's Canine Corner.

Henderson North athletic fields provide a substantial increase to the active recreation opportunities for West Goshen Township residents.

The 28 acre parcel contains one baseball field, one softball field and two multipurpose fields suitable for soccer, lacrosse, and football. The School District's limited use of the facility for girls' softball allowed the Township ample opportunities to schedule little league baseball games and adult softball leagues. The lease resulted from a search for athletic fields because of the recent closure of Hallowell Field at the West Goshen Municipal Complex due to the pending construction of the Township's new streets building.



The addition of the four Henderson North athletic fields provides a substantial increase to the active recreation opportunities already located in the Township, including West Goshen Community Park, Richard Cloud Field, Coopersmith Park, Barker Park, and Lambert Park. ★

The cost for each full session is \$300 for West Goshen residents or \$320 for non-residents.



For someone not conversant in English, even communicating that you don't speak the language can be a difficult experience. Yet, that is one of the main challenges facing the growing number of immigrants and refugees learning to adjust to life and culture in the United States.

The Volunteer English Program in Chester County (VEP) offers one-on-one instruction to those trying to master the language of their new country. Students and tutors meet for 1½ hours twice per week over the course of the year, with students setting and striving to meet goals for English competence.

VEP began serving Chester County's immigrant community in 1986 from the basement of the Calvary Lutheran Church at New and Rosedale Streets in West Chester Borough. That first year, ten volunteers helped ten immigrants with English instruction. In 2001, the independent non-profit organization moved to its current location in West Goshen Township at 790 E. Market Street. Currently, VEP pairs approximately 225 students with 180 volunteer tutors each year.

According to Linda Grosse, Executive Director of VEP, volunteers come from a variety of professional backgrounds, and range in age from seventeen years old through the mid-eighties.

"Many times people want to do this because it's so different than what they do during the day," says Grosse. "Our volunteers are busy, busy people, but they find time for this."

Tutors attend three three-hour evening training sessions in the fall, winter, or spring. Tutors are not expected to know the language of students they will work with, so they need to learn education strategies other than direct translation. In training they will use textbooks, picture books, and learn techniques such as Total Physical Response, in which tutors will act out what they are saying, and Realia, a teaching technique that involves everyday objects the student needs help with such as bills, letters, notices, or work-related items.

VEP does not advertise for students. This is partly a result of budgetary



constraints, but mostly due to the logistics of reaching non-English speakers. Because VEP serves immigrants from all over the world, there would be no one place to conveniently reach all potential clients, nor no one way to communicate their services in a way everyone could understand. Nonetheless, VEP has a waiting list of clients looking for tutors, mostly from word of mouth from past clients, employers, or family or friends of recent immigrants. Potential students would interview and be tested to determine how much or how little English they know. Students at the beginner level typically are not able to speak or read the English language. Intermediate students usually need help developing language skills for their jobs or their children's education. Advanced students usually look to develop their

writing skills. All tutoring is completely free of charge to the students.

In addition to formal tutoring sessions, students can choose to participate in English conversation groups, often held at the Three Little Pigs Restaurant in West Chester Borough or at the Tredyffrin and Paoli libraries.

"One on one tutoring is important, but it can be isolating," points out Grosse.

In addition to a full-time executive director, VEP also employs three part-time staff members who process new student intakes, oversee the training of tutors, and match tutors and students. The non-profit organization is overseen by a fourteen-member Board of Directors consisting of business people, educators, and volunteers. Although VEP receives some state education funding, the bulk of its operation budget comes from private foundations, businesses, and individuals. Annual fundraising efforts include a breakfast at Longwood Gardens, and a direct mail appeal letter.

The need for tutors is constant, as VEP continuously recruits new volunteers using such low-cost methods as church bulletins, public service announcements, community bulletin boards, and press releases and interviews for news articles. Grosse says that the unpaid tutors can find the experience to be deeply rewarding.

"Tutors say 'We learned as much, if not more from the students,'" according to Grosse. "We feel we serve not just our students but our tutors with a managed opportunity to volunteer and to learn about other people on this planet."

LEARN NOT TO BURN

According to the American Cancer Society, melanoma is becoming more common in the United States, accounting for one death every 67 minutes. As you go outside this summer, you can help protect yourself and your loved ones by taking the following actions:

Limit time in the midday sun. The sun's rays are strongest between 10:00 AM and 4:00 PM.

Seek shade. When spending prolonged periods of time outside, stay under the cover of shade whenever possible.

Always use sunscreen. A minimum Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of 15 is recommended. Reapply every two hours.

Cover up. Eyes, ears, face, and neck are particularly prone to overexposure to the sun, and can greatly benefit from added shade provided by a wide-brimmed hat. When purchasing sunglasses, check the label to make sure they offer UVA and UVB protection.

Avoid sunlamps and tanning salons. These are both artificial sources of dangerous ultraviolet (UV) light.

Watch for the UV index. This information, developed by the National Weather Service and the Environmental Protection Agency, provides important information to help you plan your outdoor activities in ways that prevent overexposure to the sun. The UV index is made available to a number of free commercial services, such as www.weather.com. ★

ROONIE SAYS...

You can help keep your canine friend safe from kennel cough.

Kennel cough, or tracheobronchitis, is an airborne disease caused by a variety of viruses and bacteria transmitted by dogs coming into contact with other dogs. Kennel cough can be spread from neighbors' dogs, at dog shows, in kennels and veterinary offices, or at dogparks such as Roonie's Canine Corner.

Typically, a dog suffering from tracheobronchitis will have a dry hacking cough that sounds like the dog is trying to clear its throat, and may have runny eyes and nose, swollen tonsils, wheezing, and a lack of appetite. In some severe cases symptoms may include lethargy, fever, or pneumonia. Clinical signs of infection usually manifest themselves two to fourteen days after initial exposure, and may last from one to three weeks. Even after a dog has stopped exhibiting signs of the disease, he may still spread the disease for up to three months, according to Dr. Willi Weichelt of the West Chester Veterinary Medical Center in West Goshen Township.

Dog owners can do their part to prevent the spread of kennel cough. If you plan on bringing your dog into contact with other dogs, such as at Roonie's Canine Corner, boarding kennels, or dog shows, Dr. Weichelt recommends having your dog vaccinated with an intranasal


vaccine for both parainfluenza and bordetella. These vaccines are also available in injectable form. Vaccinated dogs should then be isolated from other dogs for seven days while the vaccine takes effect. In some cases, dogs may exhibit the symptoms of tracheobronchitis after receiving the vaccine. Check with your veterinarian about subsequent booster shots to insure maximum protection for your dog.

Do not bring young puppies to the dogpark or any other location with a large concentration of dogs, as they may be susceptible to illness or to spreading the disease. Roonie's Canine Corner requires all canine visitors to be at least four months old.

If you think your dog may be infected, it is best to take him or her to your veterinarian to make sure the cough is not in fact a sign of a more serious illness. Kennel cough can usually be treated with mild cough suppressants or with antibiotics in severe cases. Although medications can cure the symptoms, the viruses and bacteria will still be present in your dog, so you should avoid exposing him or her to other dogs for two to three months to avoid spreading the infection.

New Web Tool Allows Pennsylvanians to Check Status of Property Tax/Rent Rebates

Eligible older adults and residents with disabilities can now check the status of Property Tax/Rent Rebate applications online at www.papropertytaxrelief.com

“Our commitment to property tax relief is unwavering, and this new Web tool enhances customer service for the older adults and people with disabilities who rely on these annual checks,” Governor Edward G. Rendell said, introducing the new tool in April.

Six weeks after submitting a Property Tax/Rent Rebate application, the applicant may visit www.papropertytaxrelief.com and check the status of the rebate by entering his or her Social Security number, anticipated rebate amount, and birth date. Applicants may use the website to confirm claim status, rebate amount, and the date a rebate is expected to be mailed or direct-deposited.

Through a similar automated phone service, Property Tax/Rent Rebate applicants can check rebate status by calling, toll-free, 888-PATAXES (888-728-2937).

The new online tool to check rebate status has the potential to reduce administrative costs for the Revenue Department. The online service is maintained at a minimal cost, while each toll-free phone call from taxpayers costs the department about 3.1 cents in phone charges, plus costs associated with staffing.

The rebate program benefits eligible Pennsylvanians age 65 and older; widows and widowers age 50 and older; and people with disabilities age 18 and older. A 2006 program expansion increased

the income limit from \$15,000 to \$35,000 (which excludes half of Social Security income) for homeowners and raises the

maximum standard rebate for both homeowners and renters from \$500 to \$650. The income limit for renters is \$15,000.

Property Tax/Rent Rebate claim forms and information are available online at www.papropertytaxrelief.com and by calling 1-888-222-9190. Forms and assistance also are available at Department of Revenue district offices (listed in the government section of local telephone directories), local Area Agencies on Aging, senior centers and state legislators' offices.

The deadline to apply for a rebate on property taxes or rent paid in 2008 is Dec. 31, 2009. ★

State Law Requires Contractors to Register with Attorney General

Beginning July 1, 2009, the Pennsylvania Home Improvement Consumer Protection Act requires all contractors whose home improvement business exceeds \$5,000 per year to register with the Office of Attorney General. Applicants will receive a certificate and wallet card with a registration number. This registration number will be required on all advertisements, contracts, estimates, and proposals with consumers in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The law provides criminal penalties for home improvement fraud and civil

penalties for violation of the act, and requires written contracts between the contractor and consumer when the total cash price of all work agreed upon exceeds \$500.
